Accompanying them on the boat were Alan, Evelyn, Helen and Graeme(AYF). The excitement was running high, especially with the children.

'Back at the ranch' – Shiskine Community Hall, a busy team were preparing to receive them for a lunch of soup, sandwiches and home bakes coffee, teas and juice. With Gerry at the helm ably assisted by Jan, Liz F., John and Chea the hall was set up, soups prepared; folks were coming and going with sandwiches and ladies from WI provided a lovely variety of home baking, a play area was made ready for the little ones (and the not so little ones). A children's video set in motion and Graeme with a good-sized group of young people set up activities in case the rain stopped outside play!

Our friends all sat down and were joined by one or two others from Shiskine. We noticed lots of big plastic bags came with the visitors and before long we were all having to try their local foods.

It was a happy gathering with plenty of noise. Then we noticed the sun was out and out to stay. By 1p.m. all were back on the buses with one bus going

up to Bellvue farm to see new lambs, stroke the pony and donkeys, view the very large cows and gaze in amazement at the strutting turkey cock who was quite vocal. Great excitement.

The second bus went off to the playpark and sports field at Blackwaterfoot where local young folk and the youth workers organised some activities.

It was a happy day for everyone, some of the visitors had been in Scotland (Garnock Valley and Irvine) for two years and this was their first 'day away' while others had only been here for two or three weeks.

Each family received a small goody bag with Arran foods and a map and we hope bridges of understanding were built on both sides. However, the day didn't just happen and there are many people to thank for their generosity:

**The Way** – the second installment of the Rev John Congram, a Canadian retired minister who reflects on where we as Presbyterians may be going wrong.

# Your may remember in February Magazine He finished by challenging us that we are too incllined to confuse 'belief' with 'faithfulness'. He continues ....

I appreciate Brian McLaren's comment in his book 'A New Kind of Christianity' "... the challenge of modernity was to rove that we're right and they are wrong. But I think we have a different challenge in post modernity. The question isn't so much whether we're right but wether we 're goodAnd it strikes me that goodness , not just right-ness, was what Jesus said was the real issue you know, good fruit, that sort of energy in pursuing and doing good, somehow I thhink more people would believe we are right"

I was recently asked to conduct the wedding of one of my nieces. In the course of our initial conversation she offered the following, "My fiance and I are not religious but but we are spiritual." In the paast I ave ben sceptical of such assertions, realising that to be spiritual tody can mean almost anything. But I have begun to wonder if \i have been wrong. Perhaps I have underestimated the activity of the Holy Spirit who, we claim is abroad inthe world working with believers and unbelievers. Instead of discounting claims about being spiritual I should instead see them as the promptings of the Spirit, I should take them more seriously as both a challenge and an opportunity to help such folk to enhance and nourish their promptings to be spiritual. I think Henri Nouwen put his finger on it when he said, "I am afraid

that in a few decades the church will be accused of failing in its most basic task to offer people creative ways to communicate with the source of life."

It is true that to be considered spiritual can mean almost anything but at a minimum it should be seen as a form of protest against how people see much of what passes for Christan faith in the church today. It is also an expression of something that many feel is essential to human life and the desire to express their faith in a variety of ways and still be considered an authentic Christian.

My single plea as we move into the future and attempt to engage the present generation is that we rely more in the guidance of the Holy Spirit and less on past trditions and practices. Presbyterian practice often seems to concentrate not on the Trinity of God but only only on the Father and the Son and neglect the Holy Spirit. Often we are suspicious and even fearful of those we feel rely too much on the Holy Spirit, including those who speak in tongues! As a result the experimental in our faith is down played in favour of the historical and doctrinal. We sometimes decry fundamentalism, but we are all fundamentalists in one sense or another. We hold certain beliefs we could not compromise on. Ones we consider fundamental to who we are. My view would be that we be fundamentalists in as few areas as possible. I would like tio take the position of the early Christians who in ther great variety were held togetherby their faith in Jesus as Lord, or as one person put it – we should be committed to Christ and for all else be uncommitted, By emphasising what people must believe to be a Christian rather than simple faith in Jesus and commitment to follow him, we limit people's freedom to express what following Jesus mean to them, while severely limiting any role for the Spirit. In fact it is basically this that we require of new members, - faith in Jesus and a determination to be his follower. Perhaps this approach should be extended to office bearers in the church. This would not limit the debates we would have in the church, including the role of gay people in the church but it would help to put the discussions in their proper perspective. The discussions would be seen as issues about which Christians might not agree but all the faithfull would still be recognised as full participants and followers of Jesus.WH Auden put it this way: "He is the way. Follow him through the land of unlikeness; you will see rare beasts and have unique adventures." I wonder if our approach to the faith limits our ability to see the rare beast and

have unique adventures.
