I remember once I witnessed a small miracle. I had offered to help a neighbour sort out her garden. Taizé Worship

I have been asked to write something about Taizé worship as an older participant and Taizé in Southeast France.

<u>Taizé community</u> is an ecumenical expression of life, practising the presence of God. That life demands a life long comminment to living in brotherhood - a

life of simplicity, worship in song and prayer with peace and reconciliation at its centre.

From February to October each year they open their community to people from many nations, (mainly 16-25 year-olds but also older people, couples and some families) for one week visits – people of committed Christian faith, people of other faiths, people with faith doubts and people of little faith or none. The one condition is that each visitor will follow the Taizé routine of life and worship and join wholely in the programme.

<u>Young people</u> are particularly attracted to Taizé gatherings week by week in numbers from c.800 to 3-4,000. Their programme for both young and older people, includes worship in the Church of Reconciliation three times a day. Daily talks and discussions on topics - for the young groups such as reconciliation, peace, justice and anger management – related to the bible with group discussion in afternoons when a number of questions are put to the small groups. (the programme for older participants is very different.) Everyone had a domestic duty to carry out every day –such as washing dishes or cleaning toilets! The meals are healthly, tasty and basic but the temperature of the shower water is very very eco!! There is time for games or a walk in the afternoon and relaxation after worship time at 21.00.

<u>Taizé Worship</u> Our week at Taizé had a profound affect of my faith. Late in life I came to accept that I had not truly learned to be silent before God – to live in his presence – declutter my mind and heart of my agenda in life – to learn to practice the presence of the Lord. It did not , does not, come easily but at Taizé I learned to be still and the difference between **being** still in God's awesome presence, and being busy **doing** service in his name. Three times a day at worship there would be much repetitive singing of Taizé songs with all songs being based on words from scripture; focusing on those few words and taking them in, there would be reading of scripture in the three most predominant laungages of those present and two <u>10 minute</u> times of silence for personal reflection on what you have heard. At first that can be a long time, especially for teenagers but after the first days there is amazing silence.

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I have an interesting DVD from Taizé which shows how Taizé impacts on the lives of young people from all over the world. Any gathering that brings so many young people to challenge their faith and help them to form their Christian faith is laudible.
